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CEO Message

On behalf of everyone at SPL who made the outstanding results contained in this report possible, I'm honoured to share our story as we contribute to the quality of life in Saskatoon. This report is an opportunity for us to reflect on the impact of our work, and to share with you the multitude of ways that the public library makes our community stronger.

Our focus on technology continued in 2018. We launched loanable technology, which allows SPL members to borrow educational technology with their library card. We completed a successful WiFi hotspot pilot project so that some of our members can access the internet at home with their library card. And thanks to a generous donation from the Friends of the Library, we were also able to invest \$30,000 into STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math) technology for use at library programs across Saskatoon.

Last year we made significant progress towards our goal for a new central library. We reached out to the community to hear what your vision for a new central library is and how you would want to use it. We were

encouraged by your desire to see a modern and progressive vision and look forward to presenting our business case later this year.

With a focus on our goal to reduce barriers to library services, we waived nearly \$59,000 in fines through our Good Readance program, created new positions for Outreach Workers, and signed a strategic alliance between the Office of the Treaty Commissioner and Saskatchewan libraries.

While I have noted only a few of our achievements last year, this report is full of evidence that the demand for library services in Saskatoon has never been greater. I hope in reading this report you get as excited for the future as we are.





What You Loved


